

**CITY OF LYNDON
CAUCUS MEETING MINUTES
MONDAY, JANUARY 21, 2019**

The Caucus Meeting was called to order by Mayor Brent Hagan at 6:00 p.m. Those present: Susan Barto, Betsy Kramer, Kelly Kramer, Carla Nalley, Becky Ricketts, Mardy Sidebottom Amy Stuber and City Attorney John Singler. A guest and Chief Throneberry were also present.

Mayor Hagan welcomed everyone to a new year and new council. Small introductions were made. The Mayor began with a few announcements. The rooster on Stonewall Way has moved to another location. The Mayor spoke with Owen Phillips, who is in pursuit of earning his Eagle Scout badge, has asked for his troop to build privacy screens around the port-o-lets at the park. The council was receptive to that idea and Mayor Hagan said he will talk to Mr. Phillips so he can begin organizing his project. A second reading and action will be on Monday's agenda for taking over Eagle Creek roadways. Discussion was held on progress of Lyndon street signs. There was also discussion about open floor speaking and conduct at meetings and how the Mayor will set those guidelines before the meeting if guests are present. Becky Ricketts suggested we have a statement near or on our sign-in sheet limiting comments. Mr. Singler said he would work on a draft

Mayor Hagan informed council of a neighborhood meeting involving a potential re-zoning at 1025 Dorsey Lane, allowing "Class A' self-storage to be constructed". Discussion was held. Council Meeting is next Monday, January 28th. KLC event City Day/ Night is February 13th in Frankfort.

Kelly Kramer asked when the city will start clearing out Lyndon Park Lane? The Mayor stated Bob Ray is going to volunteer their time, when they are available, to help clear out some dead trees. Before the summer festival the plan is to resurface the road as well to allow parking. Several other topics were discussed, Ormsby Lane property, Bob Ray construction and Grant Ave., snow/salt plan, dates for next KLC City Officials Academy. Ed Haines, from Autumn Ridge confirmed a mailbox that was hit from snow removal truck. The Mayor said he will forward info to Mr. Gillock.

Kevin McKinney, resident of Stonewall Way, came in late and asked why council decided not to continue with ordinance excluding roosters. He stated his case again and mentioned his petition he submitted. Mayor Hagan informed him since the ordinance was voted down, it will not be discussed again until a council member wants to put it on the agenda for a vote. Mr. McKinney asked if a vote could be put on a ballot? Mr. Singler explained there is no initiative for this type of issue in Kentucky.
